

PUBLIC HEARING ON OVERFISHING OF BIGEYE TUNA AND BOTTOMFISH IN HAWAII

Are you a small boat fisherman catching bigeye tuna in Hawaii? Do you bottomfish in Hawaii? Are you a recreational fisherman? If you answered yes to any of these questions, you need to attend this public hearing. The Western Pacific Regional Fishery Management Council is required to reduce overfishing on bigeye tuna and bottomfish in Hawaii. They also need data from fishermen to know what is being caught to make the right management decisions. Federal permitting and reporting requirements are being considered as a possibility to address these problems.
