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Ecological Role of Humpbacks in Alaska:

Gulp 15,000 gallons of seawater and prey



Consume
o.4 tons of
food/day
(Witteveen 2003)

Generalist - prey on large zooplankton, forage fish, adult pink salmon.





Potential competitors with forage fish, ground fish, salmon, sea birds, seals, sea lions, other cetaceans.

Play with their food - concentrate prey using barriers (bubbles, body parts, bathymetry).



Migratory - most Alaskan humpbacks head to Hawaii for breeding. But are seen every month in Alaska.

They are individuals. In appearance and Behavior.




ESA Success Story:

Humpback whales in the North Pacific are increasing at 5-7 % annually (Calambokidis et al 2008).

20,000 whales ~7.5 million people

Alaska's human pop.=723,000

What are the implications of more whales?


Competition with fisheries, fish, sea birds, and marine mammals. "they are eating all the herring/salmon smolts"

Entanglement in fishing gear Collision with vessels Complex ecosystem effect \$\$\$ from whale watching



Are they impacting commercial Fisheries

Maybe, at a local scale.



Prince William Sound, Alaska Herring population crashed Closed to fishing for 18 yrs No recovery

Humpback populations are up.

Herring populations are down.

Humpback whales eat herring.

Humpbacks eat krill.

Herring eat krill.




What we found.


Whales were eating about 20% of the pre-spawning population About the same as the fishing quota.




Estimated sources of herring mortality in Prince William Sound










What else are they doing?

How are humpbacks affecting other species?




Dilemma for wintering Herring:

Strategy for avoiding whales differs from avoiding sea lions.

Whales Present

Whales Absent



Other Species

Strong association between whales and other predators.
Whales are making it easier for other species to catch herring.







Similar story with krill

Bringing food to the surface.

More than 200 whales lateseason whales.

Long-tailed Ducks and Bonaparte's Gulls benefit.







Are marine mammals and Birds Benefiting from the presence of whales?

Yes, short term for individuals.

Are humpbacks out competing other predators (seals, sea birds, fish)?

We don't know. (seals, sea birds, fish)

Need more research.



Glaucous-winged gulls feed on herring stunned at depth by a humpback whale in December.

Entanglements

More whales means more whales getting tangled up in stuff.



Researchers, whale watchers, and the fishing industry are working together for solutions (prevention and disentanglement).





Ship Strikes

More whales means more whales getting hit by boats.



Big boats are bad for whales

Big whales are bad for small boats



The bottom line

We will have to figure out how to live with a lot more humpbacks.

In terms of dollars (from whale watching), these whales may be worth more than Alaska's herring fishery.
