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Scientists Review Bottomfish Fisheries, Federal Fishery Managers Weigh In Next

HONOLULU (22 June 2012) The Scientific and Statistical Committee (SSC) that advises the Western Pacific Fishery Management Council concluded its three-day meeting in Honolulu yesterday with recommendations on the management of bottomfish and other species in offshore waters surrounding Hawaii, American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands and the remote US Pacific Island areas.

The SSC recommended that the annual catch target for the seven deepwater bottomfish species (Deep7) in the main Hawaiian Islands for fishing year 2013-2014 remain at 325,000 pounds. The SSC noted that it is highly unlikely that this target will be reached in the current 2012-2013 fishing year.

The SSC also raised concerns about the current way that the efficacy of the State of Hawaii's bottomfish fishing restricted areas (BRFAs) are evaluated. The scientists noted that initial results from the analysis indicate no measureable statistical difference in abundance within the BRFA and adjacent areas and determining any significant effects of the BRFAs on bottomfish size and abundance may take an additional 10 years. The SSC provided recommendations on additional approaches for evaluating the efficacy of the BRFAs and also raised the following points for Council consideration:

- The status of the Deep7 bottomfish stock is healthy (not overfished and no overfishing); •
- The fishery operates under an annual catch limit, based on current stock assessment;
- The BRFAs hve not been factored into the development and production of the accepted • stock assessment;
- The fishery is now subject to near-real time monitoring through permitting and trip • reporting; and
- No evidence has been presented to suggest that fishing mortality has been reduced through the implementation of the BRFAs.

The recommendations of the SSC and other Council advisory bodies will be reviewed by the Council's Standing Committees on June 25 at the Council office, 1164 Bishop St., Suite 1400, Honolulu. The full Council will take action on the recommendations June 26-28 at the Laniakea YWCA-Fuller Hall, 1040 Richards St., Honolulu. As part of the Council meeting, a free Fishers Forum on Managing for Recovery of the North Pacific Humpback Whale will be open to fishermen and the general public 6 to 9 p.m.

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Wednesday, June 27, at Harbor View Center at Pier 38, above Nico's restaurant. Fishermen, ocean users and other members of the public are invited to enjoy informational booths, family activities, refreshments and prizes and join in the discussion about the remarkable recovery of this species and the challenges of having more than 21,000 humpback whales in the North Pacific, half of which come to Hawaii to winter.
